Clayton County District Attorney Tasha M. Mosley announces the conviction of Joshua Tyrone Shubrich. A Clayton County jury convicted the defendant of Malice Murder, three counts of Felony Murder, two counts of Aggravated Assault, and Possession of a Firearm by a First Offender Probationer.

During the trial, the State presented evidence showing that the defendant Shubrich shot the victim Iseir George in the back multiple times, killing George in his front yard. The State presented nine witnesses and published an audio recording of the defendant bragging about Iseir's murder. The defendant described Iseir George running for his life as the defendant shot multiple rounds from a Draco semi-automatic pistol. The defendant testified denying his voice on the audio recording, and ultimately ended up held in contempt of court during trial.

The defendant was serving a felony probation sentence at the time he murdered Iseir George. Iseir George, a student studying business at Albany State University, was home visiting his parents for the holidays at the time he was murdered. Iseir George passed away on December 21, 2018.

The State's case was led by Assistant District Attorney Anyssa Williams, with Deputy Chief Assistant District Attorney Rebecca Perez-Espejo serving as the secondary prosecutor. Investigator James Windon and Victim Advocate Kelita Almond also played a crucial role in the prosecution of the case.

Trial began on October 28, 2024, and the verdict was returned on October 30, 2024. The jury deliberated for less than thirty-five minutes before finding the defendant guilty of Malice Murder, three counts of Felony Murder, two counts of Aggravated Assault, and Possession of a Firearm by a First Offender Probationer.

Clayton County Superior Court Judge Shana Rooks Malone presided over the trial and sentenced the defendant to life without the possibility of parole plus ten years to serve in confinement.

District Attorney Mosley stated, "This conviction underscores our commitment to seeking justice for the victims and holding violent offenders accountable under the full extent of the law."
